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A Message from our CEO: *Mark McLaughlin*

These moments are a hallmark of our Trust and a real source of pride for me - I see these joyful, loving interactions in every school and at every stage.

Across classrooms, I have seen students who are focused, engaged and proud of their learning. This has been especially evident in the careful preparation for assessments and examinations. Staff have worked tirelessly to ensure that every child is supported, confident and ready - not simply to succeed, but to achieve their full potential. They

Replacing Catherine at the helm of the Board on an interim basis is current Board Vice Chair, George Brzyski, who will also continue in his link role among our Slough schools. We wish him every success in his new role.



George has been a Trust Board Director, currently Vice-Chair, since STCAT was formed in 2020 and has worked extensively with our schools in Slough and also with St Michael's. His background is in business, working for large corporations, investment funds and smaller enterprises,

laterally specialising in company start-ups & turnaround in Eastern Europe. Married with three adult children, George is extensively involved in the Slough Catholic community and both locally and nationally in the Polish diaspora. A member of the Catenians, he is a keen gardener and musician, plus an on-call grandad and his family's handyman.

George says, "Catherine Davies will be a hard act to follow, but I am really looking forward to stepping up to lead the Trust Board for this year. Despite the Trust's start being complicated by Covid, we have more than doubled in size since the start, while at the time maturing educationally and organisationally. We proudly present the new mission for St Joseph's and St Edward's Catholic schools

With St Joseph's Infant School and St Edward's Junior School federating, one of the first things we had to do was to agree on a joint mission.

With two such distinctive schools, each with its own strong Catholic identity, this was not going to be an easy task. Staff from both schools were invited to join a working party, and with 9 staff members volunteering to be on board, we set about discussing the strengths of both schools and looking at how other schools had created their Mission Statement.

Then, in our second meeting, one of the team members suggested a beautiful piece of Scripture that all of our previous ideas supported. Essentially, one thing was clear: LOVE was at the heart of both schools. 1 John 4:19, 'We love because God first loved us' seemed perfect. Within a short time, we had come up with multiple suggestions of values that could be hung on the word LOVE. The governors were consulted, and they loved the direction we were moving in.

The result came back fairly unanimous from all stakeholders, and our mission statement, 'We love because God first loved us,' with values attached to help us live this out, was born.


